At New Hartley First School, we aim to ignite children's curiosity about the past in Britain and the wider world, inspiring children to gain an interest in finding out about how and why the world, our country, culture and local community have developed over time, and to help children understand how the past influences the present. History will enable children to develop a chronological framework for their knowledge of significant events and people, while empowering children to reflect upon their own personal choices, attitudes and values.
